

Stanton sets record in Harrison win

Senior quarterback Drew Stanton set a single-game passing record Friday as Farmington Harrison's football team completed an undefeated regular season.

Stanton passed for 394 yards, completing 13 of 17 attempts in Harrison's 42-0 rout of host Beverly Hills Detroit Country Day.

He broke the record held by Mill Coleman, who threw for 317 yards against Northville in 1988, his junior year at Harrison.

The Hawks, ranked No. 1 in Michigan and No. 8 nationally by Student Sports, are 9-0 with a 31-game winning streak heading into the state playoffs.

The Yellow Jackets are 5-4 but still have a chance to qualify for the post-season field as a wild-card team.

Harrison, which led 35-0 at halftime, scored its first touchdown with 3:42 remaining in the first quarter when Marcus Woods capped an eight-play, 79-yard drive with a 1-yard run.

A little more than a minute later, Stanton had a 9-yard TD run, which followed a fumble recovery by Steve Wolff on the kickoff.

A 100-yard interception return for a TD by Agim Shabaz was

called back, but the Hawks were still up 21-0 before the opening period was over.

The penalty pushed Harrison back to its 40; however, Harrison produced a three-play scoring drive. Stanton's 40-yard pass to Shabaz to the CDC 15 set up another TD run by Woods on the next play.

Woods scored his third TD from 3 yards out early in the second quarter. That followed a 74-yard pass play from Stanton to Dave Condoni.

Stanton passed 30 yards to Shabaz for another TD with 1:18 left in the half. Mike Kloosterman, who was 6-of-6 kicking extra points, made it 35-0 at halftime.

Stanton was 4-of-5 for 85 yards on that possession — a seven-play, 99-yard drive. It included a 32-yard pass to Charles Pickett at midfield.

Wolff's 20-yard run late in the fourth quarter finished the scoring. The final TD was set up by Mike Sacha's interception.

Stanton was 11-of-15 for 310 yards and Harrison had 408 of its 492 total yards in the first

half.

Condoni caught seven passes for 204 yards, and Shabaz had five receptions for 96 yards. Woods carried the ball 19 times for 95 yards.

CDC quarterback Earnest Jackson was 8-of-21 passing for 90 yards with two interceptions. The Yellow Jackets had 96 yards on the ground.

REPORT 42, FORDSON 6: Once Redford Catholic Center was eliminated from the Catholic League playoffs, coach Tom Mach and his staff shifted gears for a bigger goal — a three-game winning streak and the state playoffs.

The Shamrocks capped their qualifying run Friday with a victory at Dearborn Fordson and avoided missing the playoffs for the first time since 1994.

"Wanting to get into the playoffs proved to be great incentive," Mach said. "We've made a playoff run for the last three games. We just told the kids we're starting our state run early."

And the Shamrocks (9-3) finished off the Tractors (3-5) early as well. CC led 32-0 at half, helped by three touchdowns from Mike Banaszak. He scored his first on CC's first drive on a 40-yard run.

After Fordson's next drive stalled and the Tractors punted, Ryan Wroblewski returned the punt 29 yards for a score and a 13-0 lead.

CC made it 20-0 on its next drive, as Banaszak scored from the 2 set up by a

40-yard interception by Wroblewski.

Tom Michalsen and Tom Jakacki hooked up for a 20-yard scoring pass with 8:52 left in the half; then Banaszak scored with 4:44 left on a 1-yard run for a 32-0 halftime lead.

"I thought our offensive and defensive lines did a good job tonight," Mach said. "We've been working on them all year long. In the last couple weeks, they've taken it upon themselves to improve. We won the battle on the lines."

Jason Ginkel made it 35-0 with a 32-yard field goal on CC's opening drive of the second half. Rob Eberts gave CC a 42-0 lead on a 3-yard run. Fordson finally got on the board in the fourth quarter as Ali Alamer hit Halid Alkhatib on a 30-yard TD pass.

"This has been a hard season for us," Mach said. "We played tough in our three losses, but a play here or a play there cost us."

"We played everyone tough, but if we played everyone games like the ones we lost, we might not have made the playoffs."

CC had 363 yards in total offense — 294 rushing and 69 passing on Jakacki's 3-for-6 showing. Derrick Brooks led the Shamrocks in rushing by gaining 91 yards on eight carries, and Banaszak added 89 yards on 15 carries.

Wroblewski had two interceptions while Landon Langham added another. Fordson managed just 29 yards rushing and 127 overall.

sive stands to keep the Eagles (2-7) off the scoreboard late in the first half.

The Raiders gave the ball up once on a fumble at their 24 and again on an interception at their 32. Each time they held on down as Lakeland quarterback Sean Hooper, who was 6-of-24 passing, had a lot of near misses.

"There were some moments we kept giving them the ball back, but I was pretty confident with the defense," Burrell said.

"Kasorgis had some incredible hits. The D line was stopping the run and putting pressure on the quarterback. For the most part, I was pretty confident, but we had some anxious moments."

Following the Waits pick early in the third quarter, the Raiders made it 29-0 with a two-play scoring drive.
