during SoberOctober, an effort by Farmington Families in Action in cooperation with the Farmington School District, has caught on. SoberOctober has two components — community out-reach and schools.
This year, Marie Stahl and Estralee Michaelson, the director of Safe and Drug Free Schools, sorve as co-presidents. Stahl calls herself the "interface" to school ropresentatives. Michael-son is a longtime employee with the Farmington Public School District.

"We use a healthy living theme at the schools." Stahl said. "The high schools may get more specific."

council that neighbors were afraid the Shahs would win another six-month extension, and the situation would continue.

Councilman Jon Grant said officials were sympathetic to neighbors, adding that to get the homeowner to act, "Your association is going to have to sue."

Donahue said Oakland Circuit Judge Steven N. Andrews could evict the family from the home, if the city files a motion Nov. 30 to compel compliance with the judge's earlier court order.

"That's what I would instruct be done," said Grant, to applause from the Oxford Estates neighbors.
