With a \$100,000 endowment and
a budget of \$5,000 a year, the
group set the plan in motion.

"Our mission was to enhance
downtown with at least one
sculpture for each of five years,"
she said.

The group identified 19 potential locations for sculpture in
downtown Mt. Clemens, Artists
were invited to submit scale
models. A jury comprised of
architects, a Detroit Institute of
Arts curator and the city's mayor
selected 10 finalists.

"Response was great," said
Wilke. "We had full cooperation
of the city. The city owns the **Art in Public Places**
