"The DEQ supervised the cleanup of 225 fest of 12-inch sewer line and four catch basins," said Mike Wiggins, Farmington Deputy Director of Public Safety, in a report. "They removed about 40 gallons of motor oil from the system. They finished the cleanup at about 3 a.m. Saturday morning 0ct. 13. Gushman said the City of Farmington may be able to seek financial reinbursemeinf for his department's time and vehicle use estimated to be about \$200.
