The 11-0 Trojans got a record-setting performance from tailback Tim Shaw to beat Beverly Hills-Detroit Country Day, 27-20, in a thrilling Division 6 regional championahip game.

The knock on Clarenceville was a soft schedule in the Matro Conference, while Country Day had met a series of rugged foss this season, including Birmingham Brother Rice, Reford Cathelic Central, Orchard Lake St. Mary's and Farmington Harrison.
