six points in the first half. Richmond still played a key role, handling the ball against pressure and distributing it to her teammates. Harrison doubled Canton by halftime, 28-14. "Alyana is an all-around player, because she does what she needs to do for her team to win the game," Canton coach Bob Blohm said. (The Chiefs) were extended out on Alyana and Maggie, and the key was to put somebody (in

the low post) who can score," Mantyla said. "That was a huge stop for Bryanna to score against a team like that. "Stephanie and Bryanna had unbelievable contributions off the bench. To beat (Canton) you need everybody playing hard and a couple people other than Maggie and Alyana to come through for us—and they did." Canton threw a full-court press at Harrison in the second half, but the Hawks managed to deal with it for the most part. Harrison still led by 11 after three quarters, 33-22, and was ahead by 13 with 3:16 left in the game, 37-24. The Chiefs went on an 11-1 run that narrowed the deficit to three, 38-35, when Krista Lake scored on a putback with 30 seconds remaining. "They're too well coached and they play too hard to just roll over," Mantyla said of the Chiefs. "We knew it would come down to the last couple minutes of the fourth quarter. "They had a lot of momentum on their side, but we hung on and didn't let them break us." Zak sank three of four free throws to clinch the win with 12 seconds on the clock before Canton's Courtney Jarman made a basket at the buzzer. Jarman led her team with 10 points; Katie Cezat scored nine and Lake eight for the Chiefs, who also are 12-7 overall. "I like what we did in the second half," Blohm said. "We came back and challenged them better. "Our pressure was pretty good in the second half, but we're having such a hard time scoring against zones. "Rebounding was a big issue, and we were soft defensively early. They defended and rebounded a lot better than we did. "But we can build off what we did in the second half." Free throws were the difference. Harrison was 13-of-27 at the line and Canton 9-of-20. Each team made 14 field goals (no threes) with the Hawks attempting 44 shots and the Chiefs 43. Harrison made 20 turnovers, Canton 16. "We felt the whole key was rebounding, not giving them putbacks and handling pressure, so they couldn't score off their defense," Mantyla said. "We saw they scored 61 against Walled Lake Central on Tuesday. To do that, you have to score off your defense and putbacks. Those are two things they're capable of doing, because they're so relentless on defense. "We did a decent job of only giving up guarded perimeter shots and limiting them to one shot." Mantyla added he's proud of his team because of the overall progress and development it has made. "We went from an 0-8 start to winning the division and playing for the championship," he said. "It's a credit to how hard this team has worked and willing they've been to play their roles. "I've had such a great time with this team. Every once in a while you come into a team that goes above and beyond, and this is one of those years. We've come together so well as a team."

The Spartans (4-13), who were 9-of-23 at the line, had 12 points from Lauren Trosell and eight from Amy Hollandsworth. "Free throws were really the key," North coach Tim Caruthers said. "We couldn't buy a bucket in the first half. We were up one at halftime, and it was a miracle to be ahead. "But we were taking the right shots and attacking. That's why we got the free throws. "In the second half, we played pretty well offensively. They started to pressure us in the fourth, but we were able to break their press and get some easy baskets. We made quite a few free throws, too. "It's been nice to win some tight games. The kids have stepped up and pulled them out and we needed to do that. We had some many close games all year."

W.L. WESTERN 88, FARMINGTON 27: Farmington coach Scott Lowe pulled his starters after one quarter, because he didn't like what he was seeing from them Thursday. "The starters came out, because they didn't come to play," Lowe said. "The kids off the bench tried hard and made the effort. That's why the score is more deceiving. "It's not just the fault of the five starters but me, too. I did a poor job of getting them ready. I wasn't demanding enough. "I take the responsibility. The blame is on me for not getting them ready to compete and on the starters for not having their heads in the game and not hustling on defense." Julie Kimmel scored five points for Farmington (8-10), which lost to Western by seven in a previous game. Karli Stricker, Lindsay Abbott and Amy Paquette played well in the last three quarters, Lowe said. Bridget Hannahs and Meghan Marigh scored 11 points apiece for the Warriors (12-7), who outscored the Falcons in the second quarter, 31-9, and increased their lead to 41-15 at halftime.
