Whalers stay unbeaten at home

The same thought must have been going through the minds of all 25 Soo Greyhounds as they trudged off the Compuware Arena ice following Friday night's Ontario Hockey League game against the Plymouth Whalers: "We drove five hours for this?"

The red-hot Whalers put on a clinic for the crowd of 2,611, dominating the travel-weary Greyounds, 4-0.

Plymouth, which is now 9-0-1 at home this season, improved its record to 15-2-21 — good for first place in the O'HL. Western Conference's West Division. In fact, it's the best record in the O'HL. The second-place Soo dropped to 10-8-4-0.

"It wasn't our best game of the year, but I thought we played really well," first-year Whaler coach Mike Vellucci said. "The last few games we had been playing too much as individuals and not as a team. Tonight, we played as a team. Our wingers were picking up our back-checkers and we played as one unit." The crowd was entertained on several occasions by the acrobatic efforts of goaltender Jason Bacashihua, who turned away all 18 shots he faced. The first-year Whaler, who is property of the NHL's Dallas Stars, stuffed at least four shots that appeared headed for the back of the net. It was his second shutout of the season.

"He's as quick as a cat," Vel-

lucci said, praising his gonlie.
"The key to Jason is that his composure is outstanding. Nothing gots him rattled and he doesn't make mistakes. He doesn't beat himself. And the thing is, he makes it look easy. He's definitely a future NHL goalie."

Bacashinu's most spectacular save came with just over 12 minutes left in the game when he knocked aside a sizzling shot by Soe winger Dean Byvolds, who had broken free from the Whaler defense with the puck at mid-lee.

Loft-wing Damian Surma accounted for the first two Plymouth goals — his second and third of the season.— when he beat Soe goalie Ray Emery with a 20-foot alugahot at the 3:28 mark of the first period and with a back-handed power-play goal just over five minutes into the second period.

Brad Yee assisted on Surma's first tally while Canton's James Wieniewski and Cole Jarrett nasiated on the second.


