

"Relining this wastewater pipeline is a critical need for Farmington, and I am pleased that the federal government will assist them with this project, Knollenberg said in a press rolease. "This project, which must be completed in the next 24 months, will save Farmington from the astronomical cost of replacing the pipeline white ensuring the integrity of the area's environment by preventing leaks or breaks in the pipeline." pipeline." pipeline was installed in the mid-1960s. Evaluations by engimid-1960s. Evaluations by engineers show that the pipeline is failing in several locations.

The deterioration jeopardizes the sewer capacity, increasing the likelihood of overflows in the Rouge River.

While the cost to replace the pipeline would be \$10 million, rollining at a cost of \$2.5 million will save residents money, reduce the disruption to local businesses and extend the pipeline's life by another 40 years, officials said.


MML for 19 years. He cited the MML's motto, "Cooperation solves any problems."
