Dwyer calls for clearinghouse

Farmington Hills Police Chief William Dwyer has called for creating a national security information clearinghouse to fight domestic terrorism.
Dwyer, also president of the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police, urged action in testimeny before three subcommittees of the Committee on Government Reform Nov. 13 in Washington, D.C.

The subcommittees are charged with exploring coopera-

tion between local and federal law enforcement agencies.

"When it comes to investigative support, I find that relationships with federal agencies are continually improving." Dwyer testified, '5till, the reality of law enforcement accepts Sometimes it works; sometimes it does not."

In calling for a national security information clearing house, Dwyer suggested it should be headed by the Office of Home-


