MORPH Farmington enters a new season in a good situation with nine players returning in boys basketball, including four who cither started or played a lot.

The Raiders, who were 6-5 in the Western Lakes Activities Association and 10-12 overall, lost five to graduation: Blair Weiss, Mike Patterson, Kenny Kasyouhanan, Danto Sanders and Eric Wilder.

But their leading scorer returns in 6-foot-1 senior Mike Leach, an all-round athlete who earned first-team, All-Observer recognition in track and soccer.

Leach, who can play either wing or post, averaged 11/p points and four rebounds, and he was named to the all-area fourth team in basketball.

"He played great as an undersized post player," North coach Tom Negoshian said. "Hopfully, we can put him on the perimeter more and he can be an even better leader than last year."

Five-foot-11 junior Marcus McComb will start at point guard for the third straight season.
