Students to get new tools

Clarenceville School District officials have approved the purchase of musical instruments and computers, as part of an on-going effort to upgrade equipment.
After soliciting bids for "low brass" instruments - tubas, sousaphones, euphoniums (baritone) - bass clarinets, french horns and tenor saxophones - the district received four proposals. Board members approved a \$65,500.20 bid from National Educational Music Company, based in New Jersey.
"The inventory the district does own right now has served it very well," said music teacher Joe Wauschle. "We have saxophones and bassoons that are

irreplaceable. They're very good instruments."
The district also has instruments that are 30 years old and look very much the worse for wear, and those are on the replacement list.
"The stuff that's out there looks like it's been hammered on for a lot of years," said board member Gary Garrison.
Supt. of Schools Thomas Tatten said the instrument purchase has been planned in three phases, all at about the same cost. Wauschle said concert percussion instruments should eventually be replaced, along with wind instruments like the oboes and bassoons.
The purchases approved at Thursday night's board meeting will put new instruments into

both the high school and middle school music programs, Tatten said.
"We have to remember what the middle school program does is it provides an important foundation for the high school," he said.
Computer upgrades
Botsford and Grandview Elementary Schools will benefit from the purchase of 56 iMac computers and a PowerMac G4 "server," at a cost of \$47,669, through a single statewide bid program.
Funds for the purchase come through the district's share of the Durant settlement, a lawsuit filed by a number of school districts over funding for special education.
