LIVONIA—Supporters of a petition drive to bring open housing in this city to a direct vote of the people failed this week to secure the necessary number of voters' signatures. Led by Neal C. Hall and John Stymeiski, the petitioners needed a minimum of 5.454 signa-tures of registered voters to make open hous-ing an issue in November elections. The num-ber of signatures tallied was only 3,594, according to City Clerk Addison Bacon.

LIVONIA—Construction at Livonia's new \$1,200,000 Family Y resumed this week after settlement of the building trade strike. Bill Cameron, Y director, said the strike altered the target date for completion from mid-November of this year to January, 1969.
