In a survey taken in Fran's school, the results showed that 60 per cent of the teens were on or had tried some sort of narcotics. "Drugs are a crutch and no crutch is good. It is too bad that kids have to escape from reality when things don't go their way. It never works," Fran said.

Fran and her parents get along together fantastically. "You can win a contest and friends will be happy for you, but it can also be something for their own selfish pride because they are a friend of mine."

"But my parents were really the happiest because it was for me that they were happy, I hadn't won, they still would have been happy. . . they love me," said Fran.

Fran's greatest ambition is "to be the type of person that other people can respect and, most important, that I can respect. To achieve this goal, I must appreciate the blessings I have been given, and I hope to help and aid others in any way I am able."

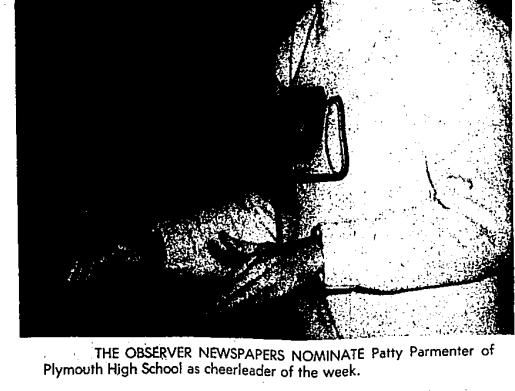
