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Accused Hills dentist suspended



After police notified state authorities, the Department of Consumer & Industry Services suspended the license of a dentist who has been charged with stalking. But this wasn't his first run-in with state authorities.

The Farmington Hills dentist facing a stalking charge has had his license to practice suspended by state officials.

Donald R. Quinn, whose practice is

at 25882 Orchard Lake Road in Farmington Hills, has been disciplined in the past by the state Department of Consumer & Industry Services.

According to the state report, Quinn's license was suspended for 45 days in December 1987 for "diversion of

controlled substances and chemical dependency.
On Sept. 28, he was detained at Motro Airport security infer they found a vial of hydromophone, a form of mephine, in his sock, the report stated. His suitcase also had vials of controlled drugs. He told security the medications were for his finance who recently had extensive dental surgery, the report stated.

Other allegations that tie Quinn into his recent arrest are listed in the disciplinary report.
According to the document:

On Dec. 10, Farmington Hills police responded to a 911 call at a Farmington Hills apartment, where a woman told police she was being held by Quinn against her will.

She told police she at first had consensual sex with Quinn, then he gave her regular injections of an unidentified medication each day.

In on one occasion, she said, she attempted to leave the apartment and he struck her, threw her to the ground and choked her.

Local police help with some non-immigrant interviews

Farmington Hills Police recently did
their part in helping the U.S. Attorney's office conduct interviews of nonimmigrant men who may have infor-

lished by the U.S. Attorney General, said four of the six men living in Form-ington Hills were interviewed voluntar-ily by federal agents and the depart-

ramington rills folice recently and their part in helping the U.S. Attorney's office conduct interviews of non-immigrant men who may have information regarding terrorist attacks.

Police Chief William Dwyer, who serves on the executive committee of the anti-terrorism task force establishment was easily selected because they recently acquired visas and came from coun-

tries associated with terrorist activi-

tries associated with terrorist activities.

In Oakland County, 20 cities were
selected and 77 residents were interviewed, the chief said.

"From what I understand (those
interviewed) were very pleased with
the process and the questions," Dwyer
said. "They had no problems whatsoevor."

The interviews were conducted based

on whether the men had any knowledge of persons capable of carrying out terrorist acts, the chief said.

"They are not suspects. These were people we feel may have information to eable to link other intelligence information of terrorist in this country or the world," he said.

Residents object to three-story building

Residents living near a vacant business on Grand River would like to see
something done with the run-down
property, but have concerns about the
prospect of looking up at a three-story
medical office building.
The planned unit development is
earmarked on the vacant National
Boatland building site, in the northcent corner of Grand River and Waldron Avenue.

The proposed development also encompasses a single family home behind the Boatland property. Under the PUD agreement, the developer gets the residential land rezoned for his project, but must work with the city in how the development will appear.

The plan calls to demolish the Boatland building and the home, to make way for the construction of a three-story, 33,000-square-foot medical
