Council discussed removing

some parking spaces at the back end of the property to allow more space for plantings that would hide the wall.

The next step, according Dale Countegan, director of planning, is for the developer to draft a PUD agreement that includes issues discussed at the meeting.
That contract could come before the council in late January, he said.
