Harrison falters in home opener

Farmington Harrison coach Dave Turnquist would have rather left the third quarter of his team's home opening loss somewhere out on the road.

Playing only its second game of the season, Harrison showed its rust by scoring a miserable three points in the third quarter of its 55-51 loss Thursday to visiting Waterford Kettering.
Senior forward Dave Condeni led the Hawks (1-1) with a gamehigh 14 points, while seniors Ralph Plumley and Matt Elsey both chipped in 8 points.
Adam Hull and Caleb Combs led Kettering (3-2) with 12 points apiece.

Trailing 10-9 at the end of one quarter, the Hawka, with the help of two 3-pointers by Jeff Ross, needed just one minute of the second to double its total. Although the team improved its offensive rhythm in the quarter, it had a difficult time stopping Kettering, which took a 25-23 halfitme lead.
Turnquist probably wishes his team didn't come out after the half, because nothing went right for Harrison in a sloppy third quarter. With the exception of a Steven (loo) McElrey layup and a Condeni free throw, the team couldn't muster anything on offense.
Kettering, led by five different third quarter scorers, took advantage of Harrison's poor shooting and turnovers to take a 41-26 lead into the fourth.

Kettering continued to control the game through the first half of the final quarter, attaining its biggest lead, 49-34, with 4:30 remaining.

With the help of Plumley, who scored all his points in the final quarter, Harrison made a torrid comebuck, scoring 17 points in the final four minutes. When Plumley hit a 3-pointer with: 10 seconds on the clock, Harrison trailed by just two points, 53-51. Kettering beat Harrison's defensive trap, however, and Chris Reeves iced the game with a layup at the buzzer.

"I thought we played very com-

placent basketball. We settled for quick, casy shots on offense. And we let them do whatever they wanted 'to when we were on defense,' Turnquist said.

'For us to win games, we need to come out and dictate the pace of the game. But they did an excellent job of slowing down the pace. The bottom line is they got more out of their possessions than we did.'

Turnquist was particularly unhappy about his team's sloppy play, which included 19 turnovers. "We're not a great shooting team, so we need to value overy possession a little more than we did tonight." Turnquist said.
