Knollenberg secures federal funds for local schools

U.S. Representative Joe Knollenberg (R-Bloomfield Hills) announced today that he has secured federal funding for projects at Schoolcraft College in Livolia (51 million), William Tyndale College in Farmington Hills (\$850,000), and Madonna University in Livonia (\$175,000).

The funding, which totals \$2.025 million, was included at Knollenberg's request in the Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education Appropriations bill that the House passed

Schooleraft College in Livonia will receive a federal grant of \$1 million for its VistaTech Center, which will provide a new venue for an expanded Culinary Arts Department and Information Technology (117) Center where businesses can access information, training, and resources. The federal funding will support program development and technology equipment to provide extensive connectivity to the Internet.

The IT Center will accommodate more than 250 computers for student

use and allow for full teleconferencing and video capabilities. William Tyndale College in Farming-ton Hills will receive \$850,000 in feder-al funds for the further development of its Interactive Learning Center for the 21st Century.

Its Interactive Jearning Center for the 21st Century. Knollenberg secured \$461,000 for the Center last year. The purpose of the learning center is to develop a hub of information systems and learning for students that will serve the entire Metro Detroit region. The Center will

utilize computers, online data bases, distance learning technologies, the Internet, intranet, video, auditor and actile informational devices.

Madonna University in Livonia will receive a federal grant of \$175,000 to strengthen it technology capacity as it undergoes a major renovation project on its Livonia campus. The federal funding will be used for the wiring, cabling, and mechanical adaptation needed to complete the renovation. plete the renovation
