glass in the city of Farmington
Hills avoided failing for a police

liquor compliance operation has been in place since 1985, to discourage liquor license owners from selling to minors.

The five businesses that sold to the minors were the Holiday Inn-Alegrin, 38123 Ten Mile; Best Western-Orchard Grill, 31526 W. 12 Mile; Chili's, 32768 Northwestern; Max & Erma's, 38503 Ten Mile.

said the Holiday Inn received a violation last December and paid a \$650 fine. Dwyer said it has been 12 years since Max & Erma's has been issued a violation. Players, Chill's and the Best Western-Orchard Grill, have no previous violations.

The five businesses that sold to minors this past week will face a hearing before the Liquor Control Commission. The five adults who sold alcohol were issued appearance tickets and

will appear in 47th District Court to face misdemeanor charges for the sale of alcohol to a minor.

The maximum penalty for the charge is a \$500 fine and/or 90 days in jail.

Dwyer said the success of the
