

Senior guards Stockton and Hindo pace North Farmington win

Christy Stockton and Jehan Hindo showed why they're the leaders on the North Farmington girls basketball team Thursday. The senior guards combined for 34 points as the visiting Raiders defeated Waterford

Mott in overtime, 53-51. Stockton scored a career-high 19 points and Hindo finished with 15. Brittany Pajewski added nine points and Kristen McElean six. Hindo scored seven of the

team's nine overtime points. Stockton scored the first two before fouling out 29 seconds into the overtime. Hindo moved to the point in place of Stockton and scored the last seven points.

"Our senior guards really led us," North coach Tim Carruthers said. "They have to be (the leaders). Tonight it really played out that way."

"(The Corsairs) played well and we struggled defensively. That's something we pride ourselves in, but they really attacked us in the second half."

The Raiders trailed by five

with 20 seconds to go in the fourth quarter. Stockton made a driving layup and, after the Corsairs missed the front end of a one-and-one, hit a triple with three seconds left to tie.

"When Christy fouled out, (Mott) started pressing us full court," Carruthers said. "Jehan played the point, and she carried us. She made some tough baskets in traffic. The kids played hard all the way through, and I can't say enough about the two seniors and the way they played tonight."

Pajewski played a well-round-

ed game that included six rebounds, four steals and four assists. Sasha Wardach led the Corsairs with 16 points. North was 9-of-10 shooting free throws and Mott 17-of-27.

North is 1-1 overall and 1-0 in the Oakland Activities Association's Division II. Mott is 0-4 and 0-1.

FEMALE 31, FARMINGTON 20: The host Eagles edged the Falcons in the fourth quarter Thursday, 11-0.

Farmington led 9-3 at the end one period and 15-10 at halftime. The score was tied at 20 through three quarters.

Brittany Coleman led the Falcons with seven points, all of them at the free-throw line. She

had three fouls in the first quarter and was benched because of the foul situation.

Angie Pailan added six points and Melissa Patterson five. Deanne Gaver had 14 rebounds and Jessica Leach nine.

Farmington was 10-of-24 at the line and finished 5-24. The Falcons are 0-3 overall and 0-2 in the OAA Division III. The Eagles are 1-1 overall. Turnovers were a problem for the Falcons, who had more than 30 Coleman runs the point but she was on the bench in foul trouble a large part of the time.

"If she's not on the floor, we have a hard time with that," coach Greg Ambrose said. "Our defense was just taking care of the basketball. The girls worked hard. I thought we were going home with one (win), but we just kind of ran out of gas and didn't finish it. That's what we have to work on how do we finish these games?"

In the goal, it was a bullet; we no chance on that shot."

The Falcons got a little frustrated late in the game when, despite a 6-3 advantage in corner kicks, failed to get another good shot, according to Meteyer.

Three players were sent off with yellow cards in the last five minutes, two from North and one from Groves.

"The referee did a good job keeping the game under control," Meteyer said. "But it was a little chippy near the end with both teams going hard for the win."
