lather and could shave no further.

They scored just one point in the final 2:45 as CC extended its defense a little and didn't give Borgess those clean three-point looks it was getting earlier.

Brandon Jennings, who had 18 points, hit a pair of triples in the 16-3 run, while Darion Bynum, who scored 19, added a three-point play in the spur.

"We were a little bit rushed at the end," Borgess coach Lloyd Praedel said. "We were shooting before we were set. Do that and you're not going to have a whole lot of chance for them to go in."

"We have flashes where we look really good. It's not an effort thing. But they seem to lose their focus and their execution

suffers.

"We made a couple of runs, but then our execution has broke down. We can't seem to put the whole thing together."

"We did against Saginaw Buena Vista, and it was a nice thing to watch, but since then we've struggled to do that."

Daqwon Lewis scored 13 points and Tjwan Lewis added 11 for the Spartans, who were outshot both at the free throw line and from beyond the three-point distance.

Borgess went 8-for-14 from the free throw line to CC's 22-for-27 shooting. Both teams made eight 3-point shots — but the Spartans took 30 tries to do it where as the Shamrocks needed just 17 attempts, unofficially. Overall,

Borgess was 28-for-68 (42 percent) while CC made 31-of-57 field goals (54 percent).

Five Shamrocks scored in double figures.

Jeff Niemiec scored 19, Tom Jakacki and Ryan Wroblewski had 18 apiece, Steve Wasil got 16 and Ryan Clark contributed 11.

Slender sophomore Dan Waterstradt (six points) acquitted himself well underneath and needs only strength and experience to become a quality player.

"Niemiec and Wasil played real steady," Coratti said, "on both ends of the court. They did a little bit of everything for us." CC opened the game with a 10-3 run and led 22-16, after the first quarter. It ran the margin out to 44-32 by the half and was

up, 67-50, when the final period opened.

"They forced that extra fast tempo," Praedel said. "We want to play that, too, just not quite as quick. We made too many bad passes and took too many bad shots."

"We hit a bit of a flat spot recently," said Coratti, whose son Anthony (a freshman at Canisius) is recuperating from an appendectomy before returning for the start of his second college semester. "But I think we're ready to pick it back up. We've worked a lot harder."

North was 5-3 in dual meets last year, losing to Northville, Livonia Stevenson and Salem, and placed fifth in the conference meet.
