decades. "Something like 20-25 percent of eli-gible kids take it from us," said Farm-ington Superintendent Bob Maxfield. Students often opt for private driving schools, which can provide classes at a time which most conveniently fits the student's schedule. Also, students are able to start as soon as they become eli-gible to take the course, Maxfield said. The cost is \$160 per atudent with an average 200 students attending annu-ally. The state provides a stipend of \$96.63 per student, which the district matches. Tuition may be charged, but

can't exceed costs, Klenczar asid. Ten teachers were used last year sludent hide, paraprofessional, one student hide, and one supervises "Last year it cost the district about 522,000 which came out of the general fund," Klenczar said. This year we anticipate about \$16,000." If the district discontinues the pro-gram, it will still be required by law to administer a voucler or student reim-bursement program, which provides partial tuition to each eligible student who completes an approved driver edu-cation program.

The money for the stipend is derived from Michigan driver's license fees, with \$4 allocated from each new or renewed license, klencara said. The state is in the process of remov-ing the wording about matching funds from the law, she added. About half of the school districts in Onkland County provide driver's edu-cation. Tray and Novi are offering the program. Walled Lake, Southfield and Birmingham are not. Tho \$160 fee is at the high end but private schools charge more than \$200, she said.
