"He started out a young child," Johnson said. 'You each have the potential to be as great. Everything you think in your mind and believe in your heart you can make happen in your life."

At age 11, King became angry and confused when told he couldn't continue to play with a white friend. "Do you think Dr. King wanted to change things?" John-

son asked.
