Mall theater operator faces state investigation

A state agency is investigating a father's complaint that his son didn't get paid and worked a 14-hour day at a Livonia theater, which has since closed.

John Sawula claimed his 16-year-old son, John, was owed money and worked from 10 a.m. to 11:45 p.m. at the Livonia Mail Cinemas on a school night in September. John attends Stevenson High.

The father, who works with the state Department of Corrections, filed a complained with the Heurly and Wage Division of the state Consumer & Industry Services Oct. 15.

On Dec. 11, the state agency determined the cinema operator, Shores Theater, which is run by David Tolfree, owed Sawula \$73.50 in unpaid wages.

"The employer sent a letter saying they did not own the theater at the time when the claimant worked there," said Maura Campbell, Consumer & Industry Services spokeswoman. "Since then we've learned the claimant was a minor."

The agency continues to investigate whether the teen worked 14 hours in one day, which is a violation of state's youth employment standards. Employers can be fined for not complying.

Investigator's attempts to reach David Tolfree have been

unsuccessful, Campbell said.
Telfree couldn't be reached for comment.
The teenager thinks other employees went unpaid. The guy's a chump, John Sawula said of his son's former employ-


