Farmington school officials are investigating a complaint that a William Grace Elementary stu-dent threatened another student with a small kalle during an inci-dent on a school bus Tuesday adornone

According to a pross release issued by the district, Principal Mark Morawski was notified Wednesday morning that a fourth grade student had a small pocket ionife, a camping utensil kit and a fishing utensil kit in his back-pack, and showed the knife when another student refused to return an item that belonged to the fourth grade. The district believes there was no premediated intent to cause harm with the knife; both the camping and fishing kits also con-tained small knives. Following protocols established by a state-wide school safety poli-cy, the parents of the students involved were notified, along with Farmington Hills police.

The student has been suspend-ed and the case was turned over to the Juvenile Division for fur-ther investigation.
