Part-time firefighters are required to respond to emer-gencies that occur during the evenings and weekends. They handle emergency medical calls and fight fires, as well as

participating in fire preven-tion activities, including inspections and public educa-

The majority of the depart-

The majority of the department's calls are medical. Training opportunities are made available so that members can upgrade their skille, obtaining certification for Medical First Responder, Firefighter 1 and 2, Driver's Training, Apparatus Pump Operator, Hazardous Materials Responder Awareness and Operations Levels and Emergency Medical Technician. The department also holds twice monthly drills to maintain essential skills.

are provided.


