

POLICE CALLS

ARMED ROBBERY

An armed robbery occurred at the Bill Knapp's restaurant on Grand River around 10 p.m. Tuesday. According to witnesses reports, a man walked in the back storage area where workers were unloading food, pointed a gun and demanded to be taken to the safe. The man put the money in a bag and asked for the money in the cash register, but was told it was empty. The man ordered the workers to the floor and left. No one was injured and the man escaped with an undisclosed amount of cash.
