# Prosecutor to extradite Quinn

The Oakland County Prosecutor's Office and the Farmington Hills Police Department plan to seek a Governor's Warrant for the extradition of Donald Quinn, the Farmington Hills dentist who skipped a trial hearing last month in Bloomfield Township.

Quinn refused to waive his extradition hearing on Monday in a common pleas court in

Philadelphia, where he is being held.

He was caught Feb. 1 after returning from a 20-day trip in Barbados, said Farmington Hills Police.

An Oakland County judge issued a warrant for Quinn's arrest after he failed to appear for a hearing on Jan. 24 in 48th District Court. He is charged with a single count of stalking, a misdemeanor.

He has a new \$250,000 cash or surety bond.

Oakland County Assistant prosecutor Matthew Martin said it's likely Quinn will be back in Michigan within a month. He said his office will ask Gov. John Engler to draft a governor's warrant to the governor of Philadelphia to release Quinn for trial in Michigan.

"Basically, all we have to do is prove it's him and that he wanted here," said Martin. The prosecutor's office is still

waiting for toxicology results before it levels any possible criminal sexual conduct charges against Quinn.

A 27-year-old Farmington Hills woman testified in an earlier court hearing that Quinn held her against her will at his Farmington Hills apartment for a month in December. In January, a judge dismissed a felony charge of interfering with a witness.
