The program is geared toward squirt players moving up to the peo wee level, as well as pee wee and bantam players who need instruction on the techniques of checking.


Areas of emphasis in the two-hour instructional session include proper checking technique, how to receive a check, how to avoid a check, stick checking, back checking, angling and body positioning.

"Im really proud of the guys. We didn't have a go-to guy. There was no
telling who was going to step up from
one game to the next. It was more of a
team effort.

"Winning 16 games was not as casy
as last year but just as rewarding.
More so to the guys here this year,
because there wasn't as much expected
of them."

The go-to guy Friday for the Lakers
was Woodruff, who scored 17 of his
game-high 24 points in the second half
to keep his team in the lead.

Green finished with 12 points; Ed
Richardson added six, Zach Hilbers
and Kyle Flanchaum five a piece for
West Bloomfield, which shot nearly 47
percent (200-43).
