Technical difficulties

Then in April 2001, Taylor said a show Levitt produced had technical difficulties and he wanted to redo the segment. Taylor said Collins insisted the original show be broadcast nonthcless and that's when Levitt decided to tape his show at other studies outside SWOCC.

He also said Collins wanted certain portions of a show removed because she considered them to be commercialization.

Taylor claims Collins has unlimited authority at the studie and his client wants it stopped.

"Cable TV is like any other mode of expression, it comes glowed in the first amendment," Taylor said.
