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# Capital improvements 'wish list' includes sidewalks

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Farmington Hills city planners
put together a wish list of capital
improvements for the city that
stretches to the year 2008.
The planning commission
recently approved the draft with
some minor adjustments. At a
recent public hearing about the
proposed projects, residents
made it known new sidewalks
were a major issue for them.
Old Homestead resident Ken
Massey said he and his neighbors want a sidewalk on Drake,
between 11 and 12 Mile done
soon.

bors want a steam of Didden between 11 and 12 Mile done soon.

"This is the third time we asked for this," he said.

The planning commission recommended moving that proposed future project to the upcoming fiscal year.

Raident Claire Petrak and some of her neighbors wanted 11 Mile between Farmington Road and Orchard Lake to have a sidewalk built along the road. She said people who live in the subdivisions along the road cannot go from one subdivision to the next because there is no pathway. She added that it would be nice if bicyclists could ride to nearby Heritage Park as well.

The 11 Mile sidewalk project is slated for the 2002/03 season, with a cost estimate of \$500,000.

Dale Countegan, director of planning for the city, said the capital improvements program allows the city to identify, printites and implement capital projects over several years. Public improvements originating from the CIP process have served improve the quality of life for all Farmington Hills residents, he said.

Countegan stated the program is a planning tool and not a promise of funding.

Some of the proposed projects for the 2002/03 fiscal year include:

Drainage projects:
1) Kendallwood Flood Proofing, which includes about 13 homes in the Kendallwood subdivision that are still having flood-ing problems upon completion of

the Minnow Pond drain improvements.
2) The construction of a retention area at the Rollcress Pond and a channel cleanout from the Rollcrest Pond South to 12 Mile.
3) Cleaning out the drainage channel from Frendt Road, west of Gill to Eight Mile Road to prevent flooding.
4) Watermain replacement of the Old Homestead Subdivision. The system has been experiencing numerous breaks and much of the system must be replaced.
5) Watermain replacement on Eight Mile east of Middlebelt, and the replacement of the watermain on Osmus and Tilman.

Some other capital improvements proposed for the next fiscal year are renovations for the
city's Heritage Park Historic
buildings.
Countegan said the city council will accept the Capital
Improvements document at its
April 8 meeting.
He said the document is a refcrence for the council to approve
projects that are in line with the
proposed budget for the city's
next fiscal year. He said the
council can follow the recommendations or make adjustments as
members see fit.
The council must approve a
budget sometime before its first
meeting in June.
