The distance group is solid; we have talent, Bridges said, adding some had jobs and commitments during the winter that limited their training time.

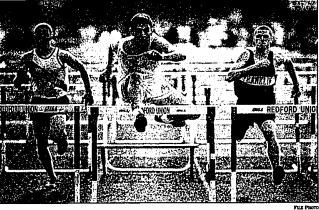
The only question is When are we going to get them into shape? Obviously, the sooner the better.

Now, all of a sudden, we're brand new, 'Bridges said.

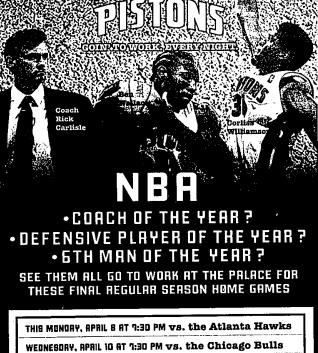
With Gaughan leading the way, Farmington is in good shape in the long jump, but it has no returning hurdlers.
