

# Tracking history

## Construction unearths old trolley line

For Brian Golden, the hunk of slotted guard rail unearthed by construction crews on Farmington Road came
as no surprise.
A trolley historian with volumes of

Farmington City Council faces more than one busy agenda Monday night, which will culminate in the appointment of a new city council mem

The council appointment is expected to be the last item discussed at the 8 p.m. meeting, according to Farmington Mayor Jim Mitchell. Officials will select someone to serve out the unex-pired term of Bill Hortsock, 51, who held his council seat continuously for

pired term of Bill Hartsock, 51, who held his council seat continuously for more than 28 years.

He recently resigned because he bought a house in Farmington Hills. His wedding to Carole Basile, a Paine Webber co-worker, was yesterday.

The term runs to November 2003, and the position pays \$1,800 a year.

"We're still going through the interview process." Mitchell said. He said he planned to interview a candidate Thursday night. This brings the number of people he's interviewed to seven. In a controversial decision — not made publicly — council members agreed to interview andidates separately and not in an open forum Mitchell explained that council members have "tried to keep it very private. I'm trying to respect the privacy of individuals "and "still \*select a councilman we can be proud of and support."

Despite being told not to contact his alloged victim, Donald Quinn contin-ued to write letters and poems in her honor while sitting in a Philadelphia

jail, authorities say.

The former dentist who had a thriving practice in Farmington Hills was charged with 12 additional felony

counts Friday. A former female patient claimed she was held captive and raped in his Hills apartment for a month.

month.

Quinn was arraigned Friday in Farmington Hills 47th District Court on the new charges, which include eight counts of third-degree criminal sexual conduct, involving sexual pene-

His bond was set at \$5 million cash surety by Judge Frederick Harris.

Quinn was extradited from a Philadelphia jail on Thursday, where he was held after authorities nabbed him for skipping a court hearing related to the case. He appeared in court Friday with his long hair uncombed and wearing an untucked white shirt that it appeared he had slept in. He told Judge Harris he was expecting attorney Lawrence Kaluzny to represent him at the arraignment, but

The criminal sexual conduct charges are a 15-year felony, Quinn is also charged with two counts of delivery of a controlled substance, a seven-year felony; one count of a drug possession, a two-year felony; and one count of pos-
