out there and screen themselves. We need to prevent cancer before it heppens. When they find out they have cancer I want the women to act on it, to get the best care possible, she said. The wonderfull thing about the Avon breast cancer walk is it's for women who don't have insurance, don't have transportation, don't have spouses, she added. 'It funds all sorts of programs that holp underprivileged women with things like transportation and childeare. It didn't take much coaxing on Madonna University student Tara Eddington's part to get her boyfriend, Wayne Wright, 24, of Detroit to join her in walking the Avon 3-Day. Wright's mother, Erlene Wright, lost her hattle with breast cancer a few years ago.

The two of them have split their training ground between Northville and Belle Isle. Their motivation has been sakatined by the walk's purpose.

"Everybody has someone in their family who has died of breast cancer," said Eddington. "Every day! I think why am I doing this, and I just think that every day someone will die for this if I don't help."

When asked why she was walking the 3-Day, Lin DeVore, 48, a registered dictitian who lives in Livonia, had a direct

answer:
"Because I can do it. It's important to change how things are done – the screening, the treatment, the money behind it...
I've seen co-workers struggle. It's a constant threat for all of us."




