Dunckel 6th-graders plead guilty

Four girls who attended Dunckel Middle School plead guilty Monday in Oakland Coun-ty Family Court to attempting to

place a harmful substance in food.

The four sixth-graders admitted to conspiring to put an overthe-counter pain reliever in their teacher's coffee in March, said farmington Hills Police Chief William Dwyer.

Another student alerted the teacher to the action of the students, Dwyer said. The teacher was tested for harmful substances, but results proved negative.

He said one of the girls acted as the lookout, another distracted the teacher and two put a crushed Advil tablet in the drink.
If the girls maintain a clean

record until age 18, the crime will be removed from their records ance they become adults, said Bob Zivian, Oakland County assistant prosecutor in the Juvenile Justice Division.

He said one of the girls explained the action was taken because the teacher hurt her Godings.

The girls could be ordered to

The girls could be ordered to perform community service and continue counseling at their sentencing, which will be June 24 before Judge Rae Lee Chabot.

Three of the girls have withdrawn from the school district while the fourth remains suspended. A hearing date for her has not been scheduled.
