Crop Walk raises funds to combat hunger

Rain or shine, people from more than 30 congregations and service agencies in Farmington and Farmington Hills are gear-ing up to join in the annual Crow Walk on Sunday, May 6 starting at 1:30 p.m. from Farmington First United Methodist Church at Grand River and Farmington Road.

Both the 10-Kilometer walk and a two-mile mini-walk will begin and end at the church. Tshirts are provided for walkers and refreshments will be served at the conclusion of the walk. through the generosity of local churches and businesses. Walkers sign up and secure pledges through participating churches.

Organized locally, this is the 17th annual Farmington/Farmington Hills walk. Each participant has gotten pledges for miles walked or simply for participating; the goal this year is 40,000. These funds will go to agencies that combat hunger through direct assistance and self-help development initiatives.

The local beneficiaries of this year's walk are St. Alexander's Food Cupboard, Neighborhood House of Farmington/Farmington Hills, the Salvation Army, and the Baldwin Center in Pontiac.

The Farmington/Farmington Hills Crop Walk is one of some 2,000 such walks taking place

around the country this year. These interfaith community events are sponsored by Church World Service, an independent agency dedicated to relief, development, and refugee assistance around the world. Funds from recent Crop Walks have sheltered refugees in Afghanistan and Pakistan, given economic development assis-
