## Mental stress affects blood flow to heart

Mental stress can trigger a lack of blood flow to the heart and increase the risk of death in peo-ple with coronary artery disease, researchers report in Circulation: Journal of the American Heart

Association.

Patients who had ischemia in response to mental stress had a three-fold increase in the risk of death compared to people without mental stress, says Dr. David S. Shepa, lead author and associate chief of to the division of cardio-vascular medicine. University of Florida Health Sciences Center, Gainesville. This adds up to a growing body of evidence that links mental stress and bad outcomes in individuals with cornary artery disease.

Previous studies have show that reduced blood flow during mental stress tests is linked to significantly higher rates of adverse cardiac events. These studies weren't designed to detect differences in death rates, however.

Researchers used an imaging test called radionuclide angiography to detect "wall medion" about malities in the heart's pumping during ischemia, which occurs when there is not enough blood flow in the coronary arteries. Association.
"Patients who had ischemia in

involves injecting a dye to label red blood cells. This lets researchers view the working heart.

"Wall motion abnormalities are specific markers of ischemia," Sheps says. "Radionuclide imaging provides us a motion picture of the heart beating, Normally there is a nice symmetrical motion of the heart. With ischemia, certain portions will contract less vigorously or bulge out."

Psychological factors such as anger or depression didn't increase the patients incidence of death in this study. They have been shown to be risk factors in other studies.


