Waidmann took the high jump relay at 17-10.

Kobus, Page, Pawel Pnaskowski and Steve Kiljanczyk also teamed up for a third in the shuttle hurdle, while the four-some Aaron Schmidt, Brian Brandon McClellan and Aaron Lanning contributed a third in the distance medley.

"We had a couple of guys to miss the bus so we had to juggle our lineup to make sure we had the right combination," Richardson said. "Lanning comes right back in the distance medley after running in the 6,400 relay. We had to run him three times. And McClellan ran a great leg.

"We had to juggle our sprint medley (fourth place) and Corey Walker helped us with a fourth in the 100."

The 100 dash was the featured individual event, and it didn't disappoint in a battle of Division IV and Division III state champions.

Defending Observerland champion Darrell Anglin, a junior from Redford Bishop Borgess, got the call over Livonia Clarenceville's Tim Shaw in a photo-type finish. Anglin posted a time of 10.77 while Shaw's was 10.96.

But the race was much closer than the two hand times indicated.

Meanwhile, Churchill's bid for his first team title since 1989 came up one point short.

Coach Rick Austin was forced to juggle his lineup when middle distance relay leg Kevin Forrette was ruled out earlier in the week with a stress fracture.

"It was pretty amazing," Austin said. "We wanted to score 60 and we scored 59. It was an exciting meet all the way around."

The Chargers placed first in both the shot put and discus relays, and added seconds in the pole vault relay (led by Howard Whitefoot's 14 foot jump), the 6,400 relay and individual 1,600 run.

In the 1,600 run, Plymouth Salem's Justin Hajduk outdistanced Churchill's Ryan Gail for the victory. Hajduk was clocked in 4:25.4, while Gail recorded a 4:27.3.

Seniors Andrew Ribar and Nick Hendra, joined junior Mike Ghannam as winners for Churchill in both throwing events.

"Our throwers were phenomenal," Austin said. "Everyone of those guys (lost personal records). And our distance people have been the backbone of our team all season. Guys like (Will) Chapman and Ryan Gail ran three and four races. An unsung hero for us was Justin Brevik filling in for Forrette."

Another team poised to win the title was Harrison, but the Hawks forfeited a third-place finish and six points in the next to last event, the 4 x 100 relay, when they were disqualified for throwing the baton.

The Borgess foursome of Anglin, DeJuan Kea, Jason Smith and Donald Ferrell, despite running in the slow heat, captured the 400 relay in a blistering 43.5, while late entry Southfield-Lathrup finished second ahead of Harrison in 44.6.

A botched handoff led to Harrison's undoing. Had the Hawks placed third in the 4 x 100, they would have tied for the team title.

"That's the first time I've ever seen it happen; it's a rare occurrence," said Harrison coach John Reed, referring to the disqualification. "The third leg we didn't get a good exchange. Our guy got caught standing still and he wasn't warmed up. That's why we've got to practice it."

"We were very frustrated because we wanted to run a good time."

Harrison, however, did set a meet record in the 4 x 200 relay as Terrill Mayberry, Marcus Woods, Charles Pickcott and Agim Shabaj were clocked-in 1:28.5, breaking the Observerland mark of 1:29.3 set by Harrison in 2000.

The same quartet also got a win in the sprint medley (2:27.1).

Harrison also captured the pole vault relay behind Ramy Sulaiman, Eric Lachotshin and Brett Laird — along with 1,600 relay (Mayberry, Shabaj, Kevin Davis and Michael Bartley).

"Our sprinters really haven't rested much," said Reed, who guided Harrison to the 2001 Division II state crown. "But this will get us ready for the big meets. I thought we really performed well and we almost broke the sprint medley record (of 2:26.7 set in 1988 by Wayne). And, of course we ran a great 4 x 200."

"It would have been nice to win (the team title), but overall we're happy."

North Farmington's lone first came in the shuttle hurdle relay as Mike Leach, Andy Zak, Brian Sinar and Brian Johns were clocked in 1:02.7. North also collected four seconds.
