The Salem United Church of Christ n Oakland Avenue in downtown armington is colebrating its centen-

on Onkland Avenue in downtown Farmington is colubrating its centur-nial this year. Despite having its steeple zapped by lighting nearly 20 years ugo, it has withstood the test of time and served as a faithful cornerstone to hundreds of worshippers, many for several generations. The church maintains the original engraved wooden pews, pulpit and altar from 100 years ago and still invites its parishioners with a mes-ange in stained glass over the front

door: "Evangelische Salems Kirche," German for Evangelical Salem

Church. Rich with heritage, Salem's found Kich with nortinge, Satema i non-ing members were German immi-grants. In fact, visitors from Ger-many today often attend services there because it reflects the evangeli-eal churches in their native country, said Salom pastor, the Rev. John Maki, who reads and speaks the Ger-mon loarnage.

Maki, who reads and speaks the cor-man language. According to parishioner William Rowe, the church used German as its language until 1929 when two servic-es, ono in English and one German, were offered. In 1933, the German services were cancelled.
