ZONING AMENDATORY ORDINANCE  
ORDINANCE NO. C-4-02

An Ordinance to amend the City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, of the City of Farmington Hills, to amend Section 34-32 to reclassify certain property as hereinafter mentioned:

The City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, hereby ordains:

Section 1. That the City Code of the City of Farmington Hills, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, is hereby amended in part to amend Section 34-32 to reclassify certain property in the City as follows:

OS-1 Office Service District classification where RA-1A One-Family Residential District classification is now shown in the area described as follows:

Sidewalk #23-1051-012

A part of the Southwest 1/4 of Section 12 T1N, R9E, City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan. The property is located on the north side of Twelve Mile Road, east of Middlebelt Road.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect twenty-one days after their enactment.

Section 4. This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Council Members of the City of Farmington Hills, at a duly called meeting held on the 13th day of May, 2002, and ordered to give public publication in the manner prescribed by law.

The Raiders put themselves in position to win the championship for the second time in three years Friday with a 5-2 victory at Plymouth Salem.

North improved to 7-2 in the division with one game remaining at home against Westland John Glenn. The Raiders are 21-7 overall. Salem and Wallied Lake Central have three losses apiece in the division.

Just like a good Major League pennant race, the quest for the Western Lakes Activities Association divisional titles is going down to the final week of the season.

And all three Farmington high school baseball teams are still in the running.

In the Western Division, defending WLA champion Farmington Harrison is 7-2 and half a game behind Wallied Lake Western, which is 7-1 with two games remaining.

The two teams play Monday at Harrison, and Western has to play a makeup game with Plymouth Canton on Tuesday.

In the Lakes Division, Farmington and North Farmington are 3-3 and one game behind Livonia Stevenson, which improved to 7-2 Friday by beating Westland John Glenn, 1-0.

Farmington, the defending Lakes Division champion, plays host to Stevenson Monday. A win by the Falcons would be their second over the Spartans and would give them a tiebreaker advantage.

The Falcons stayed in the division race Friday by winning 4-3 at Wallied Lake Central.

Andy Brown started and pitched 4.1 innings for the win with relief help from Tony Luttman and Jeff Fischer. Brown allowed five of Central's eight hits, struck out four and didn't give up a walk.

Each team scored a run in the first inning. The Falcons added two in the second and one in the third for a 4-1 lead. The Vikings picked up two more in the fifth.

Bob Houchins had the game-winning hit — a double that scored Luttman, who singled in the fifth and moved up on a walk to Brown.

Farmington (13-9) also had eight hits, including an RBI single by David Justice. Fischer had an RBI with a squeeze bunt.

Dan Miller and Ryan Triller had two hits apiece for Central, including a leadoff, solo homer by Miller in the first inning.

"I'm happy our kids are playing well, and they're having fun playing," Farmington coach Pete Finn said. "We're not executing with runners in scoring position as well as we would like, so we have to do a better job deciding what pitches to swing at."

"Other than that, we're doing OK. The pitchers are doing well, and the defense is picking up the ball. That makes it a little more fun to coach."

Hawks show mercy

Harrison (18-6) recorded its third consecutive mercy-rule victory of the week Friday, 12-2 over host Livonia Franklin in five innings.

Mike Sacha pitched four innings for the win, conceding two runs on four hits and a walk while striking out four. Eric Zatkun worked an inning of one-hit relief.

The Hawks pouled 14 hits, including three by Drew Stanton, who had six RBI with a two-run homer and a pair of two-run singles. He also stole two bases and scored two runs.

Bill Richeson, Jake Ghanman and Dan Doig contributed two hits apiece. Richeson had three RBI with a two-run single and a sacrifice fly. Rob Whipple reached base three times with an error, a hit and a walk and scored each time. Ghanman and Richeson also scored two runs each.
