

# Falcons rout Patriots in rematch

Erica Rose, Julie Goettlicher and Erin Deroo scored two goals apiece as Farmington avenged an earlier loss to visiting Livonia Franklin in girls soccer Monday.

Joyce Rose scored the other goal. "The Falcons lost the regular-season meeting to the Patriots, 2-1.

"We totally dominated that game," Farmington coach Steve Montgomery said. "We only crossed midfield two times and got two goals out of it — both from impossible angles; so they had a lot of luck going for them."

"This time Franklin played a lot better, but we still dominated the game. They played a much better game, and yet we still beat them, 7-0.

The Falcons outshot the Patriots, 16-7. In her first game back from an injury, Katie Kelly played the first half in goal. Katie Johnson played all but 10 minutes of the second with relief help from Jackie Andrusiak.

Deroo also had three assists; Johnson, Erica Rose and

"It was a very good game; the kids played outstanding," Montgomery said. "We had very good defense. Molly Jud, Shanna Barkume, Katie Johnson and Maggie Vaillancourt played outstanding defense."

Julie Goettlicher and Erica Rose controlled the midfield. They had good support from Stephanie Arnold, Jackie Andrusiak and Katie Johnson.

"Joyce Rose and Erin Deroo were up top and did real well. The forwards and midfielders were working well together. We didn't have as many shots, but we had better shots."

"We wanted the shots on frame, so we could get the rebound or, if the goalie drops it, we have a chance. If they go over the top or wide, they just turnovers. We were working on

putting shots on frame, so there's a better chance they'll go in.

"The last two games we've looked outstanding. We played a short passing game. When you do that, that's when you can dominate a game. If the other team doesn't have the ability to do that, that's when you can control the play."

Farmington (8-5-3) was supposed to play Royal Oak Dandero Thursday, but the Oaks cancelled due to an Oakland Activities Association commitment. The loss left Franklin with a 9-5-3 record.

The Falcons will play host to Livonia Ladywood in a Division II district game Tuesday night.

"I think the best game is going to be the first game," Montgomery said. "Ladywood is a comparable opponent, and we're going to have to play well to beat them."

"If we play like we have the last two games, we're going to do fine. It's just a question of the

layoff — no game Thursday, a three-day weekend and coming back and playing.

"I'd rather have a little tuneup game before the district game. Whichever team makes it out of there (Tuesday) should be facing North (Farmington) in the final (Saturday)."

"She called for the ball back and banked it in off one of their players," Harrison coach Stacey Lange Punzel said.

Shannon Abbott scored in the first half for Glenn. Lange Punzel cited the play of Dana Dault in her first varsity game since being promoted from the JV team. Harrison's overall record is 3-1-1.

"We were pleased to earn a tie on the road," Lange Punzel said. "We struggled all year in the first 20 minutes and gave up another goal that could have prevented it. We did manage several quality scoring opportunities."

## Compuware to host prep hockey finals

It's guaranteed that Catholic Central's hockey team will not celebrate a fifth straight state championship in Flint's IMA Arena in March of 2003.

That's because the state finals are being moved to Compuware Sports Arena in Plymouth starting next season. The MHSAA entered into a three-year agreement with the facility at the Association's Representative Council during its annual spring meeting in Gaylord.

Opened in 1996, the Compuware Sports Arena seats 3,500 spectators for ice hockey and is located just West of I-275 off M-14 on Beck Road.

The 170,000-square-foot facility is the home to the Plymouth Whalers and Compuware Ambassadors junior hockey teams. The arena also hosts ice shows, concerts and numerous other events.

It would be the first time the hockey will be in Southeastern Michigan since Yost Ice Arena in Ann Arbor hosted the Tier I finals in 1977.

For 26 of the 28 years the MHSAA has sponsored a post-

season tournament, the finals have been conducted, at least in part, at the Flint IMA Sports Arena.

The IMA has hosted all divisions of semifinal and final play since 1989. Yost hosted the first MHSAA semifinals and finals in 1970; and Munn Ice Arena in East Lansing was the Finals site in 1976.

The IMA site had run into some problems over the past couple seasons, which included power outages and electricity problems underneath the ice surface. The Division 1 and 3 state finals games were postponed from March 9 to 11 because that portion of the city lost power.

The Student Ice Arena in Houghton hosted one state final play along with the IMA in 1978 and 1988; and one class of play along with Yost in 1977.

"We look forward to having the MHSAA Ice Hockey Finals played at Compuware Sports Arena," said John E. "Jack"

Roberts, MHSAA Executive Director. "Our schools and fans should have a great experience there."

"We are also very thankful for the role that the IMA Sports Arena in Flint has played for so many years as a host of the finals, and we look forward to its continued involvement as a pre-finals venue."

"The ice hockey community there, with great administrative leadership from people like Dave Durkin, has always made us feel secure that the operation of our tournaments was in good hands."

The MHSAA sought hosting proposals after plans to construct a new IMA Sports Arena and renovate the current arena in Flint were placed on hold indefinitely, and the future of the building's management became uncertain.

In addition to Compuware and the IMA, Wings Stadium in Kalamazoo was a site considered by the Council as a potential finals host.

The 2003 finals will be March 6-8.
