"(Danielewicz) is pretty tough, but we had opportunities. Our goal was to put the ball in play, but we would have liked to put it in play a little harder. We just haven't hit the last couple of games."

The strategy against Misank was much the same for the Raiders.

"We wanted to put the ball in play and put pressure on the defense," Brubaker said. "Against (Misank) you try to hit strikes, relax, keep your head on the ball and let your hands go through the ball. Both teams played excellent defense. It came down to a break and a bunt."

Riker said. "All you can ask for as a coach is for the kids to come out and give the effort you want and they did that today. Now we've got something they can't take away from us. I'm a Brother Rice graduate, and I bleed black and orange just like these guys do."

CC coach John Salter said his team just couldn't cash in on the chances it had throughout the game.

"We expected runs would be hard to come by in a championship game like this, but it is disappointing the way it turned out," he said. "They gave up 10 walks to us, so we certainly had our chances. But their pitcher kept us off balance and didn't give us a lot of pitches to hit."

Shea also made a pair of terrific diving catches in the field, killing two of several scoring threats. The Shamrocks put together on the day, CC (20-5) left a total of 12 runners on base, including leaving the bases loaded in the seventh when the team rallied from a 2-0 deficit to tie the game.

Rice relief pitcher Matt Petry, who struggled in the seventh, came back to get CC out in the eighth setting up Shea's heroics.

Pickens led off the eighth with a double to center. Salter intentionally walked Cody Nolen and Dan Lentz followed with an infield single that loaded the bases. Shea then picked up the hit that won the game and league title for the Warriors.

"Chris has been through some very hard times lately," Riker

said. "We always talk about being a family, and in the last couple of weeks we've tried to be that for him. It was nice to see him come through and do well."

The Shamrocks scored their two runs in the seventh without getting a hit. Senior Ryan Rogowski sent a groundball to second, and the throw to second bounced off the

back of pinch runner Drew Ambie, which allowed Kyle-Crepeau to score from second base. Petry came in to pitch for the Warriors, and forced a ground-ball to short, getting the second out of the inning. Ryan Gallagher and Dan Wilks then drew back-to-back walks, bringing in the game-tying run.

CC's Derek Brooks belted a one-out single to right in the eighth, but got caught in a run down between second and third, ending the final CC threat.

"It's a good thing we have a little over a week to recover from this before district starts up," Salter said. "Hopefully we can get on a little bit of a winning streak before Saturday."

The Shamrocks play at Ann Arbor Huron Thursday before starting postseason play Saturday morning, taking on the winner of Tuesday's Southfield-Farmington game.
