Blues are 2nd in tourney

The 13-and-under South Farmington Blues travel baseball team made another strong tournament showing with a 4-1 record and runner-up finish in the Memorial Day Classic at Liberty Park in Sterling Heights.

For the second year in a row, the only team to beat the Blues was Pennsylvania's Beaver Valley Red team, 8-0.

The Blues were no-hit by the national powerhouse team - ranked among the top 10 in the U.S. in the 13-and-under play.

The Blues won their bracket (3-0) with victories over the Baseball Academy of Mid-Michigan, which forfeited, the Michigan Greyhounds, 17-0, and the Sylvania (Ohio) Mavericks, 2-1.

In the semifinal, the second-seeded Blues defeated the third-seeded Rochester Rockies, 2-1, while Beaver Valley beat Sylvania in the other semifinal, 16-0. In compiling a 5-0 record, Beaver Valley outscored its opponents, 64-0.

The Blues are now 9-2 in tournament play this season, having won the Michigan Bulls pre-season tournament in Dearborn.

The Blue Jays led 6-0 midway in the second inning, but the Falcons scored eight runs over the next 2.5 innings and finished with eight more in the sixth.

Andy Brown was the winning pitcher in relief, holding Southfield to one hit over 3 2/3 innings with one strikeout and one walk.

Preston Picard and Bob Houchins were 2-for-4 with two RBI apiece. Tim DePaulis also had two hits and knocked in a run. Houchins and DePaulis also scored two runs each.

Farmington (16-11) is the defending district champion and will face CC in a semifinal game Saturday at CC.

In a game between two good defensive teams, both sides knew it was quite likely one goal would decide the outcome.

That was all Livonia Ladywood, which has had difficulty generating offense this season, needed to defeat host Farmington in a girls district tournament soccer game Tuesday, 1-0.

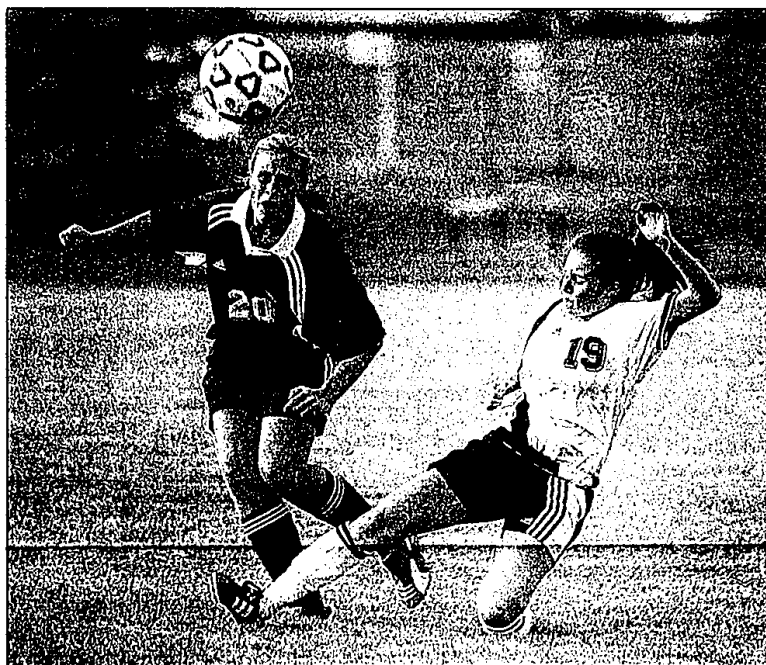
"A lot of people have been saying Ladywood can't score, and the team wanted to prove them wrong," Blazers coach Jill Logsdon said. "They were driven to score today, and that goal is proof."

Ladywood (7-4-5) advances to play Redford Union in another district game tonight and will probably be seen as a slight favorite to win the title after eliminating the defending champion Falcons (8-6-3).

"This is a great ego-booster for our team," Logsdon said. "We picked up our play, and we'll go into the rest of the tournament with a lot of confidence."

"Beating Farmington is a key win for us. They're a tough team; they played hard the whole game. It took the same kind of effort for our team to come out victorious."

While it was largely an even game, Ladywood did have an edge in posses-

sions and scoring chances.

The Blazers capitalized on one of those opportunities early in the second half when Sandy Swish scored off a rebound at 35:44.

Ladywood was pressuring the Farmington defense when Katie Rozum fired a shot that was blocked by goalie Kate Kelly, who had to step out to make the stop. That made it possible for Swish to

knock in the rebound.

"At halftime we knew we had to come out and score right away," Logsdon said, "and it would pay off for the team that scored, as long as they kept the momentum, and it did."

Otherwise, it was a game dominated by the defenses with neither side having many quality shots in the first half and just a few more in the second.

Farmington had a chance with 4:13 remaining but couldn't make the right connection.

Joyce Rose got open on the left side and lifted a pass into the middle, but the ball rolled out of bounds on the far side of the net before Erica Rose could get to it.

Mayberry leads Hawks to Oakland County title

Athletes, coaches and fans were thrilled to see the return of the Oakland County Track and Field Championships. A severe thunderstorm canceled the 42nd annual meet last year at Clarkston High School, but the prestigious event made a rousing comeback Friday at Lake Orion.

"Everyone was ecstatic to have the meet back," Lake Orion Athletic Director Jim Wood said. "It was sad what happened last year, because it's such a big event for the kids. For a lot of them, it's the last chance to showcase themselves."

The weather turned quite cold by the time Friday's meet concluded, but the exciting competitions made for a successful 43rd Annual Oakland County Track and Field Championships.

"I was pleased with how well things worked out," Wood said. "We had a lot of people help out and devote their time, including people in the administration, the athletic staff and individuals from the community."

"Some of the officials and the starters said this was one of the best groups they've ever worked with, and due to the fact this was our first time

hosting and the size of the event, I'm very, very pleased how it went. There are a lot of people behind the scenes that deserve a lot of credit. And the sportsmanship among the coaches and teams was extremely high."

Lake Orion entered into a two-year agreement to host the county meet. The 2003 championships are scheduled to be held on May 23.

Team champions

For the first time since 1993, neither Southfield's girls team nor Pontiac Northern's boys squad finished first. The Blue Jays were seeking a fifth consecutive county crown and the Huskies had their sights on an eighth straight boys title, but Rochester Adams and Farmington Hills Harrison spoiled those plans.

Adams, the Oakland Activities Association Division I champion and winner of the Division I state regional at Holly, became just the seventh girls team to score 100 or more points en route to the championship. The Highlanders finished with 101.5

"We didn't play down; we played to our level," Farmington coach Kristen Harman said. "Hopefully, we'll get a few good practices in before we face Mercy, because that will be more of a challenge."

Danielewicz pitched a three-hit shutout, striking out 11 without issuing a walk. The Raiders also played errorless softball behind her.
