Voters choose challenger, veteran incumbent for OCC board

If Y MIKE MALLST HOMETOWN KNWS SERVICE Challenger Phillip Abraham won a seat on the Oakland Com-munity College Board of Trustces Monday, ousting incumbent Jeanne Towar in an election that took a controver-sial turn at the end. Towar contended the cam-paign deteriorated to "character seasasination" in an anonymous mailing conducted only days before the voite. That mailing accused har, as well as incum-bent Sindar Ritter, of "fluciary corruption" and urged votes for Cabraham and challenger Rose Couture.

"outrageous" that the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers had endersed Towar in her bid for re-election. "I've never heard of a newspaper endorsing one of its own high-level, senior managers in an election. That's very unusual, he said. Towar is vice president of edi-torial for HomeTown Communi-cations Network, the parent company of this newspaper, and publisher of the Birmingham Eccentric. Ritter won the other sent up

Eccentric. Ritter won the other seat up for election in Monday's contest. She called it a bittersweet victo-ry" because of the loss of Townr from the board.

A because of the loss of 16WHT from the board. Six candidates, including the two incumbents, had sought two seats, each with six-year terms, on the seven-member board. Abraham placed first with 11.237 votes and Ritter second with 11.181. Towar came in third with 9,334 votes; Sandra Tyndel was fourth with 7,057; Couture fifth with 6,406; and Michael McGuinness sixth with 6,102.
