his early teens and was a caddy at
East Lake Country Club in Atlanta
where Bobby Jones was a member.

He doesn't have what he considers a regular course but plays a lot of golf at the Selfridge Air National Guard base in Mount Clemens.

"Other than that, I play all over,"
Johnson said. "I play sometimes twice
a week, unless somebody calls me.

"This is my first year of riding a cart; I used to walk. I don't give out; I just get tired."


