and all-region accolades, and she was honorable mention all-state.

"She's just a good all-around player," said Canton coach Don Smith. "She saved all the goals she had to save. She did an excellent job for having such a young defense in front of her."

Stefani Szczecowski, GK, Ladywood: The junior bounced back from a devastating injury, a broken leg suffered in her sophomore year against Madison Heights Bishop Foley.

She posted a shutout as the Blazers captured their first Division II district championship with a 1-0 victory over North Farmington. Szczecowski made All-Catholic and Division II all-state first team.

"She's the leader on the team," Ladywood coach Jill Logsdon said. "When we can count on someone in the back to make saves like that, it picks up momentum for the team."

Renee Farrell, D, Franklin: The freshman primarily played central defender and some forward, finishing with 14 goals en route to All-WLAA honors.

"Renee is one of the most intelligent and talented players Franklin has seen," coach Jenny Barker said. "She was a great addition to our defensive line and played a huge role in our wins. She had a hunger for scoring and very often did under pressure. She instantly became an integral part of our team, and she helped lead and organize our defense."

Danielle Lewis, MF, Stevenson: The senior finished the year with 11 goals and nine assists, and she was second only to teammate Melissa Dobbey in both categories.

Lewis made All-WLAA, all-region, all-district and Division I all-state second team. "Danielle had the best season of her Stevenson career this year," coach Chris Pinta said. "Most impressive were her assists, which she had more of this season than her previous three years combined."

"Danielle works harder than anybody in games and practices. She is very dedicated to the sport and will be greatly missed."

Katie Rozum, MF, Ladywood: She scored the game-winning goal in Ladywood's district championship victory. Rozum, one of the team's only two seniors, made All-Catholic and Division II all-state second team.

She was one of the reasons why Ladywood finished the year 9-5 overall, losing to Division II state runner-up and Catholic League champion Birmingham Marian in a regional game.

Erica Rose, MF, Farmington: Rose was named to the Division II all-state first team after playing a key role for the Falcons during an 8-6-3 season in which they tied 50-0 for second place in the WLAA Lakes Division.

The junior midfielder is a three-year starter who scored 11 goals and assisted on seven others this year. She was first team all-conference and all-region, too.

"She's, basically, our playmaker and the one who controls the midfield for us,"

coach Steve Montgomery said. "She's a good distributor of the ball and, obviously, a good shooter."

"She's just a good all-around player. She can play any position on the field. She's also a very durable player and a very intelligent player."

Jordan Falcus, MF, Salem: Falcus is part of Salem's promising future. Just a sophomore, she has elevated her game enough to earn all-conference, all-district, all-region and all-state third team.

Falcus filled many roles for the Rocks this season. She scored three goals and assisted on five others while concentrating mainly on defense.

"Jordan's job, if we were worried about a player on another team, was to mark that player out of the game," Salem coach Joe Nora said. "Wherever we needed to upgrade - outside midfield, center midfield - we'd put her there. Her No. 1 skills are her speed and toughness. She has great fitness."

Marissa Sarkesian, MF, Salem: Sarkesian combined with Falcus to give Salem the best one-two midfield punch in the conference. Like Falcus, she is just a sophomore, too.

Sarkesian, however, was more an offensive threat. In fact, she was Salem's offense much of the time. She scored 12 goals and assisted on five others, gathering all-conference, all-district, all-region and third team, all-state honors.

"She brings an outstanding scoring threat," Nora said. "For other teams, she was their main concern. She had a hand in most of our goals this year. We asked a lot of her and she didn't complain. She just did it."

Melissa Dobbey, F, Stevenson: The 2002 Dream Team All-State selection is only a sophomore who led the Spanans to the state semifinals.

She finished with 20 goals and 12 assists, earning first team all-area honors for the second consecutive year, as well as all-region, all-district and all-WLAA.

"Melissa makes a difference in every game she plays," Pinta said. "She drew attention against every team we played this year, which created opportunities for others. Melissa is a student of the game. She loves to practice and get better. She'll take more of a leadership role as she enters her junior season."

Stephanie Johnson, F, Canton: Perhaps the best news for Johnson is that her soccer career is anything but over. A senior, she will play at Western Michigan University in the fall.

An all-conference selection, Johnson led the Chiefs in scoring with 16 goals and seven assists. Thirteen of her goals were scored in conference play. She was also all-district, all-region and all-state honorable mention.

"She was definitely our main go-to person this year," Canton coach Don Smith said. "In big ball games, she played 80 minutes. She never even had a chance to come off the field."

Kyle LaPorte, F, Churchill: The sophomore finished the year with 15 goals and seven assists, scoring against nine of 11 WLAA opponents. LaPorte made both all-WLAA and Division I all-region.

"Kyle was always dangerous; she was the focal point of our offense," Churchill coach Dave Hebestreit said. "She has both speed and ability; yet she's a very unselfish player. She was just a pleasure to coach."
