County board tinkers with terms of art tax for November ballot

Oakland County voters will decide the fate of a 0.5-mill property tax increase to subsi-dize 17 metro Detroit museums and cultural facilities on the

and cultural facilities on the Nov. 5 general election ballot. Maybe. The 10-year millage will be on the ballot if the Wayne County Board of Commissioners and Detroit

Commissioners and Detroit City Council agree with amendments to arts tax legal language approved by the Oakland County Hoard of Commissioners last Thursday, David Doyle, a Lansing-based consultant who represents the 17 facilities pushing for the arts tax, said he remains confident, but not certain Detroit, Oakland and Wayne will come to terms in time to put this proposal before voters in Moganilee.

put this proposal before voters in November. "We hope there isn't a prob-lem, but we're not sure," Doyle said.

All three governing bodies must agree on terms that would create a Metropolitan Arts and Cultural Authority, a ninemember board with three representatives from each municipality.

pality. This board would disburse This board would disburse tax dollars for cultural facility and museum programs if voters approve the millage. At Wayne County's Aug. 1 board meeting and Detroit City Council's Aug. 2 session, each

board is to discuss language sought by Oakland County. Any changes require approval of all three boards. If this process extends several more weeks, the issue cannot go on the November ballot. Considering last week's Oakland County resolution gained approval by a 13-12 margin, Commissioner Eric Coleman (D-Southfield) said he

an (D-Southfield) said be doubts his colleagues would ratify another arts tax resolu-

tion.
"I'd probably get killed if it comes back to us," Coleman said. "Some commissioners simply don't want it, but I feel the public should decide what they pay taxes for and not pay taxes for."

The half-mill levy would increase properly taxes for the owner of a \$200,000 home by \$50 a year.

This new millage would generate some \$4+ million annually to finance new education programs, facility enhancements and free student field trips to the 17 facilities, including the Holocaust Memorial Center coming to Farmington ing the Holocaust Mentorial Center coming to Farmington Hills, Cranbrook Institute of Arts in Bloomfield Hills, Detroit Zoo in Royal Oak and Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn.

Ford Museum in Dearborn. A similar proposal was nar-rowly defeated by voters in November 2000, but Oakland County leaders exercised far more scrutiny this time around. "Since we're paying 50.4 per-

cent or the tax dollars for this thing, we wanted to get some thing fair for our tax dollars, said Commission Chairman Tom Law (R-West Bloomfield). "In not saying Im going to vote for this, but I wanted to make sure we gave voters the best possible product." In the amendments, the county board wanted to make sure revenue from the new

ounty board wanted to make sure revenue from the new millage, if approved, doesn't subsidize reduced general fund commitments to the Detroit Zoo from the City of Detroit. This is supposed to enhance programs, Lus said. If the city akes general fund money away the programs are sustained, but not enhanced, at a cost to Oakland County taxpayers. Commissioners wanted to make sure the board chairman holds one of Oakland's three appointments to the Metropolitan Arts and Cultural Authority. County Executive L.
