# **Knollenberg wins big in primary**

#### Incumbent congressman to face West Bloomfield attorney

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U.S. Rep. Joe Knollenberg had no trouble carning the Republican nomination and continuing his quest for a sixth

continuing his quest for a sixth term in Congress.
The Bloomfield Township resident garnered 86 percent of the vote to defeat Bart Baron, a Troy Republican, in Tuesday's primary. The election involved voters in the reapportioned 91 primary in the election throwed voters in the reapportioned 91 key to the congressional District, much of which is new territory for Knollenberg.

"Anything can happen in a primary, but we feel very good about the result and now we look forward to the geheral election." Knollenberg said.

Baron, an automobile industry consultant, made his second run for Congress. Two years

run for Congress. Two years ago, Baron lost a bid to unseat U.S. Rep. Sander Levin when

l into Troy. He didn't plan to spend anyed into 1709. He didn't plan to spend anywhere near the \$1.6 million Knollenberg has banked for his re-election campaign thus far. Baron planmed to personally finance all his campaign expenses. He hoped his fiscal-conservative and pro-labor message would appeal to voters. Knollenberg said that result doesn't trouble him.


"Most of the action was in the Democratic gubernatorial race, so that's where many people voted," Knollenberg said.

In his previous re-election campaigns, no challenger could raise more than \$250,000, a fraction of Knollenberg's average war chest of \$1 million. Fink already has some \$800,000 generated with plans to raise much more.

Analysts said both candidates could end up spending some \$5 million each. That would make this one of the most expensive Congressional campaigns in the nation. The fact a Democrat can raise so much in this area, analysts added, is indicative Onakhand County's changing political tide which was once a Republican stronghold.

Knollenberg and Fink are abtiling to represent Michigan's most affluent Congressional district, which includes Birmingham, Troy, Rochester Hills, Farmington Hills, Royal Oak, Waterford, Lake Orion, Pontiac, West Bloomfield and Bloomfield Township.
