Ten football players from Observer & Eccentric communities went out as win-ners Saturday when their prep careers officially ended on a balmy August evening in Ann Arbor.

All contributed in some way to the East's 28-7 victory over the West in the 22nd Annual Michigan High School All-Star Football Game at Michigan

Three of the more visible East all-stars were Farmington Harrison quarterback

back Tim Shaw and Birmingham Brother Rice kicker Ross Ryan.
