FROM PAGE AT January, the city learned Congressman Joe Knollenberg (R-Bloomfield Hills) helped to

(R-Bloomfield Hills) helped to secure a\$1.5 million Environmental Protection Act grant. "He took this up for us and learned about the process we were going to use, the cured-in-place pipe." Lauhoff

said. The grant is a 55-45 split.

The city pays 45 percent.

If the project costs \$2.5 million, the city will use the entire \$1.5 million. If It doesn't, the city will get less than the \$1.5 million. Lauboft said.

"We won't know that for some time," he said. "We do know that the amount of money we have to bond will be much, much less than the \$1.8 million. I'm guessing that it will be in the \$50,000 range. That's a \$1.3 million reduction to the taxpayers."

Diversion will save \$100,000

Farmington will bypass its sewer system during an upcoming sewer liming project, but the whole process will be "invisible" to residents, according to Farmington City Manager Frank Lauhoff.

The process used will save the city \$100,000, Lauhoff

The city separated its sewer system in the early 1990s, so it is no longer combined or overflowing in the Rouge River.

To do that, the city had to build extensive pumping systems and they had to build a three million gallon retention basin located on Nine Mile Road and Brookdale, said Farmington City Manager Farmington City Manager Frank Lauhoff.

About 20 percent of the facility is above ground and visible, the rest is underground. Yit was built to hold liquid so it doesn't spill into the river during rainy periods or rain events, Lauhoff said. "Rain events bring more water into the system."

About 500 feet of pipe can be worked on per day during the project.

project.
In most situations,
Instituform Technologies USA
Inc. of Owosse, the company
doing the work in Farmington,
would use bypass hoses around
the pipe area where they are
working so the sewer system
can continue to flow.
These hoses, which resemble

large firehoses, bring sewage above ground and then down again.

"That's extremely expensive," Lauhoff said. "They estimate because they don't have to do that, we will save an estimated \$100,000 in bypass pumping. When they are working on a portion of pipe, we will actually shut down the whole sewer system going to Detroit. What we will do at our pumping station is pump what is still coming into the system into the retention basin." Nobody will know. The sys-

Nobody will know. The sys-tem will continue to operate as it always does.

"We can pump into these "We can pump into these retention hasins for eight hours at a time while they are working on a pipe," Lauhoff said. "At the end of the day when they are done working on the 500 feet of pipe, we will then turn the pumps back on pump from the retention hasin what we pumped in there and pump that back to Detroit because we can do that if it is dry weather."

WHAT IF IT RAINS?

Everyone will watch the weather closely.

"This whole project, without rain could take five weeks to complete," Lauhoff said. "With rain events, it will take seven or eight weeks to complete." Institutorm has done pipeline rehabilitation nationwide, he evid

"They have put in hundreds thousands of miles of this pipe. They have a lot of experi-ence in it," Lauhoff said. "The process originated in England in 1976. The original pipe stays in the ground. This goes inside of it."

The company guarantees the

pipe for 50 years.
It will probably last the community 75 years, Lauhoff said.
This is a big deal. It's a monny 18 years, Linton suc. This is a big deal. It's a tremendous improvement to the system for the community. The public spends millions of dollars for systems which they don't see that are in the ground. But, they are so important because you use them everyday. We take it all for granted. If this pipe failed, maybe 80 percent of the toilets in this city wouldn't work. That's how important this pipe is.
