Hertel, speaking before members of the press and sponsors at a fair preview on Thursday. "We'll start four days earlier. Instead of two weekends, we'll have three. And one weekend will coincide with the Dream Cruise. I'm certain we'll do some special auto displays." The fair will run full days, from 10 a.m.-midnight, Friday through Sunday, next year, but open at 4 p.m. on weekdays.
